NEW YEAR'S GREETING "Immeasurable Light and Life."

At the beginning of the new year, I would like to send you my greetings from Hongwanji in Kyoto.

Last year was truly a difficult year. At first I had hoped that from April, we could conduct an exciting and lively memorial for Shinran Shonin, one which is observed only once every fifty years. However, the March disaster changed everything. Although I believe that the agony of the disaster affected people goes beyond anything we can imagine, this catastrophe has brought me to ponder everyday about what we should do, what we can do, and what the future holds. The nuclear power plant accident, in particular, has caused tremendous difficulties for not only the victims in the area, but has also hindered the enthusiasm of people engaged in relief and restoration activities, as well as plunging the future of not only Japan, but also the entire planet into uncertainty and apprehension.

At the same time, we are truly grateful for the monetary and material contributions for our relief efforts and condolences that the people throughout the world have been sending to Japan.

It is easy to grasp the meaning of the sentence "Everything is impermanent," but extremely difficult to accept the truth which it expresses. Being aware of the working Amida Tathagata's wisdom and compassion could enable you to take a step forward in accepting and realizing this stark truth.

Massive earthquakes and unsettling weather patterns that caused great famine had also taken place during Shinran Shonin's time. It is certain that the teaching clarified by Shinran Shonin, including shinjin, the heart entrusting to Other Power and our expression of gratitude as the Nembutsu, corresponds to the experiences that he actually went through. In saying Namo Amida Butsu and following the path to the Pure Land where we can attain Buddhahood, we are able to find possibility of solving the issues lying deep in our minds, which cannot be resolved merely by our own attempts and efforts.

We saw a variety of aspects in the tsunami disaster, namely, some past experiences that were well employed, while others were totally forgotten or ignored, and we were also faced with our excessive trust in scientific technology. How we should control our endless desire that we can never rid ourselves of as long as we are foolish beings and how we can make use of our limited wisdom and capability are issues that I have accepted as our assignment for the new year. Keeping in mind that all life is embraced in the Light of Amida Tathagata, together, let us walk forward.

世界各地の方が心配してくださり、義援金などのお見舞いをしてくださいましたこと、まことに有り難うございます。

諸行無常という言葉は理解しやすいですが、その現実を受け容れることは容易ではなく、その先へ進むためには、阿弥陀如来の智慧と慈悲のはたらきが必要な方となってくださると思います。親鸞聖人の時代にも、大地震があり、気候不順から飢饉がたびたびあったと伝えられています。他力の信心、お念仏一つという教えは、親鸞聖人のご体験と相応しているに違いありません。できることをするだけでは満たされないごころの奥底の課題は南無阿弥陀仏によって往生成仏の道を歩むところに解決の可能性があります。

津波災害では、過去の経験が活かされたところ、忘れられたところ、無視されたところ、あるいは、科学技術を過信したところなどがありました。凡夫の限りない欲望をどのように抑え、限りある智慧や能力をどのように活かすかは、新しい年の課題だと受け取りました。あらゆるいのち、阿弥陀如来の光の中にあることを思いつつ、共に歩む日々を過ごしたいと思います。

HAPPY NEW YEAR to all readers of "Hikari the Light" published by the Buddhist Temple of Southern Alberta! Let's continue to listen and appreciate Buddha's Teachings in 2012.

Many years ago, I was working in Vancouver as a minister. I was about 30 when I was transferred from Alberta to Vancouver. Looking back over these years I think I was a bit a "namaiki", cheeky and self-conceited young man lacking the sense of appreciation.

I remember that there was a kind and quiet elderly lady about 90 or so. One day I visited her in her home. At that time, she was making a tiny paper doll out of origami. After chatting for a few minutes, I prepared to leave. She offered me the doll she was making saying, "I just made it. Please take it with you." I thanked her and left. When I got in the car I took a closer look at the paper doll I had received.

To be honest, it was not well made but nevertheless, I took it to my house and gave it to my wife. Then I forgot all about it. About a year later, the lady died and I performed the funeral service for her. That night my wife and I talked about the lady. My wife said "She was a very kind and quiet lady. I liked her. She was one of the gentlest ladies I have ever met. She was very thoughtful."

I agreed with her, saying "She was making paper dolls and giving them away to everyone."

My wife said "Yes, I still have that doll she made."

"What!?" I said. "You kept it? It wasn't very well made. I thought you had thrown it away"

Then she said, "How could I have thrown it away. I know it wasn't nice looking, that I can see, but I am sure she spent a lot of time to make that one with her trembling hands and poor eye sight. How could I have thrown it away!" I did not say anything to my wife but I was a bit ashamed of myself. My wife saw something beyond the tangible. I had just merely seen the outward appearance.

You see, when the lady gave me that doll a year earlier and I received it and said "thank you", I did not truly appreciate the kindness inside of her, her heart and mind. It is easy to say "thank you" when we receive something tangible but we often overlook the heart of kindness, love and care within.

Similarly, it is hard to receive and appreciate Buddha's mind. We see the statue of the Buddha with our eyes but often fail to see Buddha's mind.

One of Sutras says;

"Buddha's body is Buddha's mind. Buddha's mind is the great compassion. Buddha's compassion is unconditional to liberate all beings from the realm of suffering and delusion to the realm of enlightenment."

Buddha is not form but the working of compassion for all sentient beings in suffering and deep ignorance due to self-centered mind.

The Nembutsu literally means to be mindful of the Buddha. After listening to Buddha's teaching we come to realize that the Buddha of the boundless compassion, actually, has been mindful of us, you and me and called on us from time immemorial. We begin

to realize that Buddha's compassion, kindness and care have been always embracing and nurturing us. I often hear elderly followers say "o-nembutsu" to show a deep respect to the word. Because "Nembutsu" is actually not our possession but Amida's gift working for us to awaken us to the life which is true, real and sincere.

“The religious experience of Jodo Shinshu is rooted in what is known as Shinjin in Japanese and often defined as “the awakening of faith” in English. While the ultimate objective of life in JodoShinshu lies in the achievement of Buddhahood, life’s immediate purpose is realized in the awakening of Faith.” (From Rev. Kenryu Tsuji’s *The Heart of the Buddha Dharma*)

With the dawning of the New Year, it is generally a time for optimism and hope as we look forward to the events and activities for the coming year. Although we are fortunate to be living in a country where we can begin the New Year with a sense of anticipation, the reality is that there are many throughout the world who are not as fortunate. For them the New Year is just another day as they struggle to make a daily living.

One of the fundamental principles of Buddhism is Dependent Origination; it is regarded that all phenomenal events are dependent on one another. There is nothing that exists by itself. All things are inter-related or inter-connected. If we truly understand the principle of Dependent Origination, then we must also realize that suffering too is not independent of itself. Where there is suffering, the rest of the world is also affected either directly or indirectly. Through the tragedies as the Earthquake in Japan we see the fragility of our own existence and become aware of the preciousness of all life. May we wish all countries involved in violence to stop their actions and work towards True Peace for all sentient beings on this earth.

As a new chapter in the history of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism in Canada is about to unfold, may I wish you all a very peaceful New Year. Let us strive for Peace throughout the world in 2012, keeping in mind the true calling voice of Amida Buddha.

BTSA Notes

New year greetings to everyone as we begin January, 2012. The month’s name comes from Janus, a mythical Roman god, depicted appropriately with two faces, one looking to the future and the other the past. Appropriate, because it’s traditionally a time for most—including BTSA—to do the same.

Reviewing the past year, we count in the Hikari the loss of 14 friends of the Dharma, many of whom were in their 80s and 90s and served their original temples and BTSA with great devotion. We build on this solid bedrock of past achievements, for which we are deeply grateful. The upcoming Ho-onko service specifically commemorates the memorial of Jodo Shinshu’s founder, Shinran, but it generally may be thought of as our expression of indebtedness and thankfulness to all those who have preceded us.

BTSA reaches a milestone of sorts on Jan. 16 with the fifth anniversary of being registered formally with the Province of Alberta. But, that date only marks its formal documentation. The amalgamation agreement was signed a month earlier on Dec. 18, 2006, following years of preparatory groundwork. With this history, we look forward with high hopes toward the next five years.

December concluded a busy 2011, with a Bodhi Day service on Dec. 11, a special musical presentation by Dii Lewis at the Dec. 18 service, and a visitation from Christina Yanko, a Jodo Shinshu ministerial candidate, on Dec. 23. (Please see items related to these elsewhere in the Hikari.) We also held the second class on Buddhism on Dec. 7 that drew more than a dozen persons and a movie night on Dec. 9 which was attended by about 30 people. The year ended with the joya-no-kane (bell-ringing) ceremony at the Nikka Yuko Gardens on Dec. 31, and the new year was begun with a shusho-e (new year’s day) service the following day.

Please keep in mind that the Ho-onko service is scheduled for 2 p.m. on Jan. 15, in conjunction with the monthly memorial (shotsuki) service for January and the temple’s new year’s party following the service.

Other January activities planned are a turn at the Lethbridge Soup Kitchen on Jan. 24 (Toban 2) and a mein noodle making session on Jan. 28. We would like a big turnout of helpers for the latter event.

We will be updating the schedule for Sunday service chairpersons and welcome anyone wishing to be included on the list. Please let Sway Nishimura or any board member know of your willingness to serve in this capacity.

At its December meeting, the board:

- approved revised temple rental guidelines, a set of which will be put on the temple website and in the reservation book in the foyer;
- agreed to recommend \$100 membership dues each for 2012 and 2013 to the annual general meetings of both years, the 2012 AGM set for March 4, 2012, following the monthly memorial service; and,
- was asked to encourage members to stand for nomination to the board at the AGM. Six new members are needed to insure a complement of 12. Terms for five members will be ending.

Reminder: BTSA board minutes are available in the board room and open to interested members.
