## The other day I noticed the following words in the Buddhist daily calendar hung at the temple entrance: "Believe that great wisdom and compassion embrace everything."

Being in Canada as a Buddhist minister for over forty years, I am quite sensitive about the word "believe" in a Buddhist context. Strictly speaking, Buddhism uses "believe" only in a conventional sense to stress what we might hold without reason, for Buddhism is not a belief system. So sometime I jokingly say "Buddhists believe in the Dharma but they do not need to believe it!" The Dharma is the law of the universe. We do not need to believe the law of the universe. We do not need to grasp it so tightly. The historical Buddha says "just open your eyes and see things including self as they are." He was not a believer of something. He was a discoverer of the Law of Life. Therefore, he was called an awakened one, the Buddha.

The other day I met a gentleman of my age, originally from Japan like myself. Generally speaking, many people of my age do not go to temple, even in Japan. Why? It is because we who were born right after World War II did not receive a proper religious education. We weren't nurtured or brought up in a religious atmosphere. Therefore, we are not really accustomed to attending temple on a regular basis and to listen to the Dharma. At any rate, he happened to come to temple to attend a memorial service for a relative.

Just before the service started he hesitantly told me "I haven't been to a Buddhist temple in Japan. This is my first time at a Buddhist temple." Then he asked "What

is Buddhism? What do Buddhists believe?" I said, "Buddhism teaches us that 'man is born, gets sick and dies.' That is what Buddhism teaches us. We don't need to believe it."

He said "Well, it is natural. Everyone knows it." So I said "Yes, it is natural. Everyone knows it. As long as we are aware of it we have no problem."

In Buddha Dharma, we do not need to believe something. You might say, "Well, all religions have something you must believe in." In this sense, Buddhism may not even qualify as a religion. We do not need to believe that water in a river flows downstream or changes momentarily. We do not need to claim something unyieldingly and say I believe this. This is called "jiriki-no-kokoro" meaning a calculative mind by which we are not able to find peace of mind.

The Buddha tells us just open our eyes. We can see that life is interconnected and interdependent and thereby everything is changing momentarily. Man gets old, gets sick and dies. It is natural. The Buddha did not teach us things which are unusual. Each moment is precious and unique. A baby is beautiful. But an old and elderly man and a woman are also beautiful.

Amida Buddha is the Dharma in action and compassion. We do not need to believe this. Let's forget to grasp things, including ourselves, with our small self so firmly. Whether we believe or not, Amida is always and constantly there working for us. Amida Buddha calls on us, constantly shining, crushing our small ego self and bidding us to return to the realm of true awakening of Namu Amida Butsu.

ラジオで、「社会全体が銀行のようになって来た」、というような意味のことを言っていました。つまり、お金社会です。それは、しかし、今に始まったことではありません。お金がたまると、とかく名誉が欲しい、権力が欲しいとなります。あるいは、名誉、権力のために、お金を求めます。そこに争いも生まれます。世の姿は今も昔も変わっていないのではないのでしょうか。それでは、聞法がどう役立つてきたのか、どう役立つのか、と問われそうです。役立つという考えには、とかく、わが身の損得感情が働いているようです。これが迷いの根源であります。教えを聞いても、何の役にもならぬと決めつけるのです。そうではなく、まず、仏願を聞く、ということです。自己を学ぶ、ということがいつの世にも大切なことではないのでしょうか。仏願とは、私たちの損得勘定、我執を超えた、清浄で、限りなく大きな世界に帰って来いという、真実の願い、呼びかけのことです。役立つとか、役に立たぬとかという損得勘定をしばらく横に置いて、仏願を、わが身に聞かせて頂くのです。人間の損得勘定、まよいの世界に仏願が働いていることを知らせていただくのです。「水清ければ魚すまず」と言われるように、人間のまよいは底なしで、清くない世界を住家に私たちは生きているのでしょうか。そのような世界を離れては生きていけないのが人間であるようです。清くなる見込みがないと知り抜いての仏願です。その願いを、私たちは、ただ聞いていくのです。わが身を知らせてもらいながら、仏願を仰ぎ、仏願に頭を下げていくのです。親鸞聖人は、お念仏だけがまこと、と言い切り、そこに安心されながら力強く生きられたのであります。合掌 泉康雄

- completed application forms for the temple's turn at the casino in September;
- approved a parking request from the Nikkei Cultural Society for its second annual trip to British Columbia ghost towns on

June 20 through 24; and

- was told the ABC Committee has been meeting to flesh out the program for the event on Oct. 28, 29 and 30. Don Castro sensei of the Seattle Buddhist Betsuin Temple has been confirmed as speaker, but a theme still has not been selected.

## BTSA Donates \$32,461.73 for Japan Disaster Relief

The BTSA donated the \$32,461.73 raised for the Japan Disaster Relief Fund to the Canadian Red Cross. The Board decided at its May meeting to make the donation now, leaving the account open for further donations. We continue to receive monies for the relief fund. The funds were raised through the memorial service on March 27, the udon/movie night receipts and donations on April 2, numerous mail-in envelopes and a bake sale on April 30 that was co-sponsored with five other organizations, representatives of which are pictured with Izumi sensei. Proceeds from the bake sale exceeded \$6,200. To the right of Sensei are Sharon Tamura, representing the Japanese United Church; Yuki Nagoya, Southern Alberta New Japanese Immigrants Association; Marlene McCaughey, Okinawa Cultural Society; Derrick Smithson, Red Cross staffer; Pat Sassa, Nikkei Cultural Society of Lethbridge and Area; and Noriko Goji, with baby Mizuki, Japanese Language School. Our thanks to everyone who helped raise funds, participants, purchasers and people within the community who donated generously.



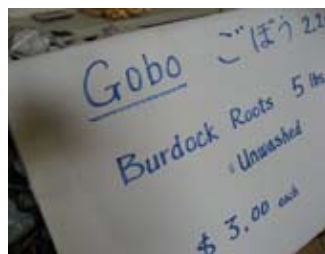
## BTSA Joins with Community

Speaking on behalf of the Southern Alberta Buddhist Choir, we were more than thrilled to join with Janet Youngdahl and the University Singers to sing “May Peace Prevail” as part of Music to Heal the Heart and Soul, a concert for the victims of the Japan earthquake and tsunami. This event held at the Southminster United Church, led by

music professors Deanna Oye, and Janet Youngdahl, University of Lethbridge and sponsored by the Nikkei Cultural Society of Lethbridge and Area involved music, poetry, readings and dance. Izumi Sensei, chanting San Bujo and reading White Ashes, joined other ministers, students and musicians, including the temple choir and Andrew Ichikawa with David Renter and his U of L student combo. Donations went to Salvation Army to benefit Japan’s victims. Significant for us was that this was the first public performance in Canada of the gatha “May Peace Prevail,” written for the 750th Shinran Shonin Memorial, with the original poem by Carrie Kawamoto printed in the program. Our thanks to Pat Sassa, David Tanaka and NCS for their part in the excellent organization of and participation in the event.

The Community Bake Sale to benefit the BTSA Japan Disaster Relief Fund, held earlier that same day was the culmination of a partnership and working together of a number of like-minded participants, including the many donors, working together for the benefit of others to guarantee its success. The participating groups (see photo and description), I might say, joyfully, worked together to accomplish their contributions. In addition to the participating groups, there were many donors who gave. Of those we are aware of, thanks to SANJIA for t-shirt donations, Ken Nakagama for two cases of packaged arare, and St. Michael’s, and St. Teresa’s Villa staff and residents who donated baking. # Highlights of the JSBTC/WF AGM 2011 Toronto, April 30 - May 1

**BTSA delegates: Eichi Tanaka & Sylvia Oishi**

**WF delegates: Donna Dubbelboer & Sumie Tsukishima**

- We welcomed our new Bishop (Socho) Grant Ikuta of Steveston, who replaces our Interim Bishop Tatsuya Aoki.
- The Living Dharma Centre is in a state of transition given the recent passing of Dr. Leslie Kawamura, who was the program director.
- The JSBTC website is being managed by Robert Miyai, who also manages the Manitoba Temple website. He would welcome additional content and ideas for the national website from any members across Canada.
- The JSBTC by-laws require change in order to comply with new Federal legislation relating to not-for-profit corporations. Draft by-laws were presented to the delegates at the AGM and approved in principle. Once they have been approved by Industry Canada, they will be returned to the 2012 AGM for final approval.
- JSBTC will begin to draft an updated policies and procedures manual for approval at the 2012 AGM. One of the topics of interest for such a manual would be the definition of individual "membership". Since there is no standardized definition used by all Temples, JSBTC has requested that all Temples submit their current description/criteria of membership for JSBTC consideration. Another matter to be addressed in the policies and procedures review will include the Bishop selection process.
- David Major, member of BTSA, was elected for another term on the JSBTC Board.
- The next JSBTC AGM will be held the last week of April 2012 in Winnipeg, MB

## JSBTC WF

- Membership dues were paid for 85 members and in addition, \$500 was donated to the WF Dana Day Fund.
  - WF continues to collect stamps for Save the Children and Oxfam. Last year, funds from the sale of used postage stamps went to the Bolivian project. The amount was matched with a grant of 4 to 1 so the money raised from the sale was over \$1,000.
  - Foreign coins will be collected for American UNICEF. The funds raised this year are being used to assist the children affected by the recent earthquake and tsunami in Japan.
  - Sustaining Funds for 2011 are being considered for Christina Yanko who is studying Buddhism in Japan and hoping to become a minister.
  - Shop & Support has raised \$7,655 of which BTSA earned \$2,167.
  - T-shirts sold: 171 across Canada
  - Dana Day Funds – \$10,000 donated to the Japan Earthquake Relief Fund.

  - 2011 - The 14th WBW Convention Kyoto in conjunction with the 750th Memorial for Shinran Shonin is May 12th - 18th. 48 people are going to Japan, 22 women and four men are going to the Convention.
  - A formal request will be made to Hongwanji to decline hosting the 2015 WBWC.

## Notes on New Temple Financial Procedures

Looking after temple finances has become a major job and it's hoped our attempts to streamline it with amended procedures will simplify the process. John Dubbelboer and Trent Takeyasu have agreed to look after temple finances until the next annual general meeting in March, 2012.

We ask for your patience and understanding as we go through the transition from our former co-treasurers, Robert Takaguchi and Gord Saruwatari, to whom we are grateful for their service since BTSA's establishment in 2006.

Henceforth, transactions will be recorded onto a computer dedicated to the treasurers and cross-checked by them.

The aim is:

- to pay bills and reimburse individuals for monies spent on behalf of the temple on a monthly basis;
- to issue tax receipts within the federally-prescribed time period of two months after the end of the calendar year;
- to maintain requesting donations be made by cheque (not cash);
- to continue counting and depositing donations on the first and third Sunday monthly and acknowledging them in the Hikari; any donations received after the third Sunday will be noted in the following month's Hikari.

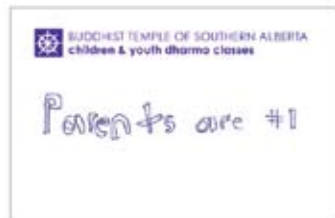
The Finance Committee is comprised of the co-treasurers, Roy Sassa and Akira Ichikawa.
